programming and carvices Adult Victim Services

•Supports adult crime victims ages 50+ who live in New Castle County. AVS helps clients navigate the many systems that impact their lives after being victimized. AVS provides many services including counseling services, home visits, court accompaniment, intensive case management, long-term follow up care, and assistance in establishing a reliable support system.

Community Reintegration Services Program (CRSP)

•Case Management Services for adults on probation across Delaware. DCJ Case Managers in probation and parole offices help connect participants to services and supports that help meet basic needs, personal goals, and probation requirements, including housing, supportive benefits, mental health and substance use supports, employment, and education.

Transitional Reentry Services

•Provides reentry support to adults exiting the Department of Corrections Level 4&5 facilities in Delaware. Transitional Reentry offers mobile Peer Support services statewide, picking individuals up upon their release and offering transportation services and support for the first 90-days post-release. Case Managers and Peer Specialists connect participants to services and supports that help meet basic needs, personal goals, and probation requirements, including housing, supportive benefits, mental health and substance use supports, employment and education.

•S.E.L.F (Safety, Emotion, Loss and Future) groups are held at the Department of Corrections Facilities, Baylor Women's Correctional Institution and Hazel D. Plant Treatment Center. SELF Groups address some of the key areas of recovery related to chronic stress, trauma, and family and relationship problems.

Healing Spaces

• A free support group for Black people to share personal experiences with racism, process racial trauma, and get supportive feedback.

Systems Navigation

•The Systems Navigator provides statewide education and advocacy related to the Pardon and Expungement process in Delaware through networking, community events, and individual support. Individuals who qualify for a pardon or expungement can receive one-on-one support from the Systems Navigator.

Delaware Center for Justice... programming and services. School Offense Diversion Program

• An alternative to the juvenile court process and punitive disciplinary approaches – a space for mediation with students to talk through and understand the nature of the incident and to validate their experience. Students work through personalized plans to learn to skillfully resolve problems and sustain healthy relationships so that what may have been their first experience with the legal system is their last.

Restorative Services/Conferencing

• Utilizing Restorative Justice principles and values, our Conferencing Program offers those who have been harmed (victims) the opportunity to address those who have caused them harm (offenders) in a safe, structured setting, with the goal of directly holding an offender accountable for their actions while providing important assistance to the victim. With the assistance of a trained facilitator/ mediator, those harmed are given the opportunity to explain how they have been impacted by the harm done to them, how the person who harmed them should be held accountable, and if they feel that justice has been served.

Youth Reentry Services

• Provides reentry support to adjudicated youth exiting residential placement in Delaware and out of state. Youth receive pre-release daily programming, including Forward Thinking, Restorative Justice, and Vocational workshops, one-on-one Case Management support, and customized Reentry Transition Plan that supports their social, emotional, and reentry goals. After their return to the community, youth and their families continue to receive wrap-around case management services for up to a year while they are on Juvenile Probation in Delaware.

Youth Institutional Services/Forward Thinking

• The Forward Thinking Program is a group program for youth at the New Castle County Detention Center. Forward Thinking is an Interactive Journaling curriculum that uses evidence-based strategies to assist youth involved in the criminal justice system in making positive changes to their thoughts, feelings, and behaviors.


what sates Read Out Program (RIRO), a collaborative project between Delaware Center for Justice, Delaware Department of Corrections, and Read Aloud Delaware, seeks to help incarcerated persons mend, strengthen, and maintain the relationships and bonds with their children, which have often been strained or disrupted due to their involvement in the system, by offering opportunities for these individuals to participate in long-distance reading with their children.

In the RIRO Program, parent participants select their favorite age-appropriate books from the RIRO library to read aloud to their children while recording on a voice recording device. The book and a USB drive with the audio recording are then both sent to their children so they can listen and follow along!

As a collaborative project, Delaware Center for Justice and Read Aloud Delaware are responsible for recruiting, providing, and training the staff and volunteers to facilitate the RIRO Program within DOC facilities, while DOC determines eligibility and recruits parent participants for the program.

In addition, Delaware Center for Justice serves as the liaison between Read Aloud Delaware and the DOC and is responsible for all other aspects of programming.

RIRO Program... why is this



Nearly half of the people in state prison are parents of minor children, and about 1 in 5 of those children are age 4 or younger. Between 1991 and 2016, the latest year for which national data is available, the number of fathers in prison increased 48% and the number of mothers increased 96%.

Historically, nearly 10 million young people have had a mother, father—or both—spend time in incarceration. Today, close to 2.7 million children or 1 in 28 have an incarcerated parent.

About half of people in state prisons are parents to children under 18

In fact, there are as many children with a parent in prison as there are adults in prison.

Over 1.9 million people are confined behind the walls and bars of the 6,300 correctional and detention facilities in the United States.

RIRO Program... why is this initiative

The number of children impacted by parental incarceration... MORE THAN 2.7 MILLION. 1 in 28 young people whose lives have been touched by incarceration experience a multitude of challenges:

Interruption of Parent-Child Attachment / Bonds

Academic & Cognitive Challenges
lower educational achievement + impaired
teacher-student relationships + attention
deficits + speech and language, and learning
disabilities

Psychological Strain & Antisocial Behavior fear + anxiety + Ioneliness + anger + depression

Traumatic Loss stigma + shame

HOWEVER, as research suggests, the strength or weakness of the parent-child bond can play a significant role in children's ability to overcome these challenges.

Despite the circumstances, that is parental incarceration, parent's ability to read aloud to their children, not only allows them the opportunity to support their child's cognitive development, and improve their communication and parenting skills, but also helps them to develop and strengthen their bond with the children from a distance.


